AUXILIARY PROBLEM.

An auxiliary in the Romford district has become dissatisfied with his present position, and as he believes that the Postmern's Federation cannot improve the working conditions of his class, he has decided that it is not good enough, and ask if there are any other employments in the Civil Service which would suit him and offer better prospects of advancement.

His plaint is that, hadly as auxiliary postmen are paid, their position is growing steadily more precarions, his clothing and boot allowances are devindling, and he is faced with the probability of discharge whon revisions take place.

It is true that the position of an auxiliary postman is not one to be coveted, but I cannot for the life of me suggest a new-rocation. Everything depends on a man's capacity, energy, education, initiative, and opportunitios.

Furthermore, it would be dangerous to advise a Civil servant to jump out of the firing pan into the fire—for I know of no department in which the runk and file declare that they are well paid and contented with their lot.

I do not think that my friend does justice to the Postmer's Federation. It is not as enemy of his class, in that it does not desire to exterminate the men. On the establishment of all postmen, which, it effected, would very materially improve the position of the auxiliaries.

It is also true that the federation has not been able to do much for these men, but this is pricipally due to the apathy and selfichness of the men themselves. There are about forty thousand auxiliaries in this country, but only four thousand are members of the Postmen's Federation. Under these circumstances how can the other thirty-six thousand auxiliarity pottmen expect to get something for nothing? If they were to do the right thing and join the federation they would stand a far better chance of improving their positions in the service.
