**WELTER-WEIGHT BOUT FOR

WELLS AND CARPENTIER.

Johnny Summers will have to defend Lord Lonsdale's wolver-weight challenge belt and his title of 10st. Brits. champion of England against Sid Burns, the Alderney boxer, in December at the N.S.C., unless something remarkable happens to prevent it. Summers won the belt from Arthur Quenden-Young Joseph having relinquished that headquarters in June, and had not Burns been had in America at the time he would then have been the opportunity of competing for the trophy and title.

Burns, immediately on his return to England, challenged Summers, but as each holder of a Lonsdale emblem is entitled to a six months' rest, it was not possible to give him the match until the last month of the year. Both men have now been notified that the contest will be held in December, and as each is eager to hitch in the negotiations is anticipated.

Before this Summers is likely to meet Hogan in a special contest, as Mr. Fred Hooper, the English champion, is, however, is endeavouring to obtain from the Australian champion a slight concession regarding the weight restrictions he is imposing.

Carpentier has been notified that he must complete his match with Papke in London on October 22 before he enters into any agreement with Wells prior to the date. This complication may put the Wells-Carpentier match over until the latter, providing the English champion is willing to wait until then, but that the match will come off is considered a certainty.
