Not since the Billiards Control Club set out in rivalry to the Billiard Association for the government of the game has there been such a sensation—so far as law-making is concerned—as that caused you as no nouncement made resterday by the Control Club that no entry from licensed victuallers, or from anybody connected with a licensed house, would be accepted for the club's amateur championship.
