TRACERY BEATS LONG SET.

NEWMARKET, Oct. 14.—The Second October Meeting opened to-day in fine but dull weather, and we had the satisfaction of seeing the course in excellent trim. It is to be hoped the conditions will be equally good for the Cesarewitch to-morrow. Not so long since there looked likely to be some thirty runners, but there have been many withdrawals, some of the best-backed candidates failing in their preparations. Still, there will be plenty of competitors, as the list of probable starters shows.

It will be observed that Mr. de Rothschild runs Lavine in preference to Lorenzo, but I fear the former will not quite stay. At the Cesarewitch race everybody asks how many will stay the two and a quarter miles. Warwingham won last year. He is equally well in now, and he is fit. I leave out Fantasio in preference to Warwingham, Grave Greek, Wagstaff and Rivoli. The last-named seems a big order, and some market reports declare him likely to start first favourite.

Rivoli was obviously unfit at Newbury. The money now shows a different situation. No class caused more upsets this season than the three-year-olds, and Night Hawk's St. Leger victory is not convincing. Grave Greek is a stayer, and one of the gamest, and may win, but I give my vote to Wagstaff.

Nothing more regrettable has been heard this season than that so many excellent two-year-olds have become thick-winded, and so spoiling all hopes of the brilliant career not so long ago expected of them. Stornoway is declared on authority to be affected. The colt came out now in the Clearwell Stakes, decided over the easiest five furlong course here, called the T.Y.C.

Bookmakers were pleased to trade in the circumstances at liberal rates, and Stornoway only three others were backed and for little money. Stornoway practically made all the running and won easily by three lengths, so there is no doubt he will compete on Friday in the Middle Park Plate.

Some smart youngsters ran in the Alington Plate. Sherwood's stable was represented by two. Sir E. Wadley Griffiths's Castaneta and Captain Homrath's Sikh. Neither was fancied, and, indeed, the betting was confined to four others. Of these three ran first, second and third, the last-named position filled by the favourite, Princess Dorrie. Saint Cyr, ridden by Jellies, drew out with the lead, and interest in the race was centred in that colt and Kheri. The latter got to his neck, but St. Cyr, fighting with great gameness and on a dead straight line, beat him by half a length.

Opinions were so sharply divided as to the merits of Tracery and Long Set, racing at level weights over the mile and a quarter in the Champion Stakes that only a slight shade of odds marked the difference in the betting. There was no close thing in the contest. Tracery, forcing the running, led all the way. He had Long Set in sore trouble before reaching the Dip, and won amid great cheering from the spectators. It was simply a vindication of Tracery's superior class.

There was a fine race in the Suffolk Nursery, in which Siller got home by a head from King's Scholar and gave R. Wootton his second winner of the afternoon. In the Newmarket Oaks jockeyship and superior class enabled true to win. Maher's nursing tactics and fine finish were effective. Little Alden, in the Apprentices' Plate, had a comfortable ride on his father's horse, Medley.

VARSITY RUGBY BEGINS.

Big Trials for Oxford and Cambridge in Opening Games

Oxford and Cambridge have started on the serious work of the season with their Seniors' and Freshmen matches. On Saturday the Dark Blues are at the Old Deer Park, meeting the Old Merchant Taylors, and Cambridge receive a visit from the Old Leysians. In both these contests the University men, on the recent club form, will be hard pressed.

It is always pleasant to record the fact that the rival Blues have turned out, as until they have done so the season does not really seem to have begun. Until the great struggle at Queen's Club the games in which they take part excite more general and genuine interest than the ordinary club encounters. Such is always the case in matters of sport where University men are concerned.

Already the prospects of the Universities have been discussed, but it must be more or less guesswork. Cambridge, who managed last December to break Oxford's long sequence of wins, would seem to be assured of a fine side. All the old Blues are available, but it does not follow all will play. It is more than likely that Cambridge, the captain, may find himself in a dilemma with so many to choose from. Among the Freshmen there must be one or two with strong claims to recognition, but the fact that they are just up will tell against them. The captain may decide against them on the score that they can wait a year. Men who have just missed their Blues will stand the better chance. Still, with all the material to his hand, Cambridge has not an easy captain, has to build up practically a new side. Eight of the old fifteen are in residence, but it is doubtful whether Donald, Geen and Knott will be available through injuries. Some doubts had been expressed about Leach, who missed his last year, but played for Scotland. He turned out for the Old Leysians last Saturday and obtained three tries.

One may take it whatever happens, two pretty good officers will appear at the West Kensington enclosure, and in the meantime Rugby men will closely follow the form of the men. It would be worth it to be started with a defeat next Saturday. It is not such long odds against such a double event coming off. It is tolerably certain the Old Merchant Taylors will make the Dark Blues go all the way. The Taylors' victory over Blackheath was a thoroughly genuine affair. On their form against the Scottish Old Leysians must have a good chance against Cambridge. In point of physique the Scottish forwards are really splendid, but were not good enough to overcome the Leysians' backs, who are very clever and handle the ball with certainty. The Light Blues will be well tested.

Londoners will have their first chance of seeing the Cantabs on Wednesday next at Honor Oak Park, where they meet Guy's Hospital. Here, again, they will be extended, as Guy's have a useful side.

SPURS WIN AT FULHAM.

Tottenham Hotspur defeated Fulham yesterday in the second round of the London Challenge Cup at Craven Cottage by 2 goals to nil after a very interesting and last game.

The first half was keenly fought out, with the exchanges fairly even, but the Spurs showed decided superiority in the second portion, and after eight minutes Ray Middlemis gave them the lead and immediately after added a second goal.

Subsequently the Tottenham forwards pressed heavily, but Reynolds in the Fulham goal was in brilliant form, and saved many hard shots. About 7,000 spectators were present.
