JOCKEYSHIP MAY DECIDE CESAREWITCH.

EXIT RIZZIO.

I am looking forward to Cesarewitch week at headquarters. I have not been deceived by glad skies into leaving the heavy overcoat at home, for I know the winds that blow across the famous heath in October-in fact, often in July! And I am not worried, indeed I am relieved, at the added determination of our players.

Not being of an age yet that permits me to strok a long while back, I feel in sympathy with the editor of a noted comic paper who says that "British racing has got its general way" but so great is it used to be.

He responded blandly, "It never was."

Every fresh season we are told that the thoroughly stayer has gone to the dogs,

but estimate the question of race, and

not the jockeyship, is the truth.

In this case more horses capable of getting that strenuous journey—two and a quarter miles on the collar, with a genuine start from the bushes—for a good many seasons have come along.

At all events, the Cesarewitch is a handican,

and not a classic or cup contest, and class must be judged thereby.

Certainly the fates have been kind to my racing friends, who would have thought it in March last that they would be top of the handicap and the sole pretender from Manton, Gauntburn, Prince Chimney, Air Raid, and now, presumably, Queen's Square have gone. The expected arrival of Queen's Square from Donoughmore to renew a Newbury acquaintance with Langdon Hills.

BOOK HORSES.

The sole remains of the old seen King John and old St. Elie for I presume Cesarewitch will rest on her Kempton display. I could have fancied her more for the Cesarewitch if her preparation had been without touch of racing. To my mind, very few horses in the field can be compared with Maledy, King John, St. Elie, and Gated.

At least, the handicapper would have to put them higher in the scale if he found the weights affected. Perhaps the London Hills will be compared with the Hill, but the Hill has come to St. Elie. Silvia for two lengths at Newbury, and Hill can mean nearly a length over the Cesarewitch journey.

At least, yesterday his confidence began to run many fine candidates away from King John, Golden Melody, Unlucky, and Langdon Hills. I know Cottrell fancied both Javelin and Gay Lord. You cannot try the Lynx type, so Mr. James White has picked the couplet. Mr. Walker-Wallace is a long shot, which is a good sign of a shipping magnate. Lord Glanely, and his partner, never wavered, their locking and kicking being all that could be desired.

One veteran resident correspondent prefers Eton Rambler to King John, basing his judgment on the fact that Mr. Gilpin has not adopted the old school of racing, but steady Cesarewitch preparation.

The prejudices supply the spice of racing, but he has the big battalions against him. Money does not always get a map home, but it gives the confidence of men who know their business from A to Z.

PAPER-WEIGHTS.

It stands to reason that with many horses genuinely fancied and expected to stay, the horses will all play their parts, but the horses like the Grand Nationals, such as Hatai, St. Elie, Blackheath, Langdon Hills, Javelin, Warwick, White Heat, and Unlucky will be very strongly handled—by men of power as well as by jockeys.

Martin (King John) and Colting (Gay Lord) are proved good jockeys, but naturally they are not the equal of Carkiss, Hen, Teignmaner, Chidde and Whalley. When you get down among the "paper-weights" you have to hesitate. If Colting really were a free-striking old fellow, I should prefer his chance above everything, but—

I fear that Rhodes will saddle both Carkiss and Hen, and the "Office" has the roads. By the way, if you take a line through Green Scholar there is nothing much between St. Elie and King John, and we have seen it demonstrated in practice that the latter will get the course. Like Langdon Hills, he will appear in a strong position than at Newbury, and I fancy both will turn the tables on Silverbridge. I can leave it at that for the time being.

There was nothing very sensational yesterday, and all eyes were on the negotiations for the departure of Unwin's anticipated. There has not been enough rain yet to make the going yielding, but every trainer will appreciate "laid a lot."

MY DEAR'S FAILURE.

The Cambridgeshire will inevitably hang fire until the long race is over and the livers see how they stand over doubles. The much-honoured Rizzi cannot tackle the hard ground and has been beaten. There is no room for him to turn the corner.

He will, however, be well supported by a strong position than at Newbury, and I fancy both will turn the tables on Silverbridge. I can leave it at that for the time being.
