# BOAT RACE PRACTICE.

#### Oxford Row Their First Full Course Trial To-day.

Light work was the order of the day at Putney yesterday, when the weather was dull, but very mild. Cambridge did not go out in the morning, but Oxford did some paddling exercise at 12.30 on the low water. Mr. Harcourt Gold took over the coaching duties, and will be in charge until the day of the race.

In the afternoon the Light Blues were afloat shortly before four. They paddled up just above Hammersmith Bridge, and then turned. Just below the mile post they tried a start with a Thames scratch eight stroked by J. Beresford. Rowing 19 strokes in the half-minute, they beat the scratch by a bare quarter of a length.

Another start with the scratch was tried from moored skiffs, but how and "4" in the Thames boat broke their oars at the first stroke. Cambridge kept on, and, rowing 19, 19, 36, got great pace on the boat. They afterwards paddled down below the bridge and back. The form shown was satisfactory.

Oxford were out for the best part of an hour. They went up to Chiswick Steps in easy stages, turned, and dropped down to the middle of the cyot. From that point they rowed and paddled through to Putney Bridge. The rate was 28 most of the time, but they had a couple of quarter-minute butsts, and finished by rowing in from apposite the Leander boathouse at 32. The torm showed some improvement.

Both crews will be out this morning at 10.30. In the aftenoon Cambridge will be aftoat about three. Oxford will row their first full-course trial, starting from Putney Bridge about 2.30.

#### LONDON SCHOOLS CHAMPIONSHIP.

By the exercise of some self-sacrifice on the part of several of the competitors who have played when certain of their leading players have been requisitioned by the district representative team, the London Schools Championship is now brought up to date, and all is plain sailing for the semi-final round this week-end.
