

# THE KING WINS THE BRETBY STAKES.

Success of Princesse de Galles Enthusiastically Cheered.

## SUCCOUR BEATS SIR ARCHIBALD.

NEWMARKET, Thursday Night.—Again there was summer-like weather as the King drove up from the royal quarters at the Jockey Club rooms to the course this afternoon. The programme opened with the Bretby Stakes, and his Majesty had the satisfaction of seeing his colours carried successfully by Princesse de Galles after a pretty race against Mr. Hall Walker's Queen Mother and the Duke of Portland's Roche Abbey.

Universal cheering broke out when the Princesse drew away with victory assured as she breasted the hilly finish. The King, greatly pleased, acknowledged the popular acclaim, and immediately returned to the paddock to await the winner's return. Her jockey, Herbert Jones, was honoured beyond all ordinary measure when his Majesty remarked, "Thank you, Jones; you rode a very good race."

Speculators had been much divided in opinion as to the merits of the rivals, and indeed there was almost as much money invested on Queen Mother as on Princesse de Galles. The latter showed most decisive superiority, and her performance restores to a great extent the reputation so recently blighted in her previous outing, when so hard pressed by Phalaron in the Boscaen Stakes.

Gloucester had nothing more than an exercise canter in the Prendergast Stakes, but something of a puzzle was set in the Selling Welter, for which Petual, Peter Parley, and Milford Lad were each equally well supported. The two-year-olds, Fizzer and Pyx, began very speedily, but were beaten on reaching the dip, where Peter Parley drew out and ultimately scored readily by a length from the 20 to 1 chance, Lord Carton. Mr. Hilbert afterwards bought Peter Parley for 480 guineas.

### DIBS BEATS LAOMEDIA.

Dibs, fretful and sweating, did not impress one favourably in the paddock, but he was good enough to beat his two opponents in the Lowther Stakes. Laomedia held first place in the market, and Rousay was as much fancied as Dibs by many of the biggest backers. Rousay ran prominently for a mile and a half, but Dibs headed him in the dip, and the effort put in by Laomedia only secured her second money.

Cheque, made favourite for the Ditch Mile Nursery from sixteen others, got well away in company with Caspian, followed by Bonnie Lassie, Humourist, and The Fastnet. The others were bunched together, except Black Sea, who seems a youngster of bad moods, and swerved when the barrier went up. The leading lot had plenty of whip at the close of the seventh furlong, but could not keep pace thence to the end with The Fastnet, and she won by three lengths from Leghorn, whose nearest attendant was Cheque. When betting opened wagers of 1,000 to 100 and 800 to 100 were booked about Cheque, and the price was quickly cut down to a fourth.

Mr. J. A. de Rothschild's Quickbeam made all the running in the Heath Plate, and won from Slavetrader by a length. This colt, the medium of sensational wagering at Doncaster, now started at 10 to 1, though at the bottom of the handicap. He was well backed, but the public fastened on to Slavetrader, Fort Myers, and Snatch as most likely to supply the winner. Orquill and College, now meeting on different terms to those at Birmingham, had support, but neither did well, and the chief feature of the contest was the ineffectual dash made by Maher on Slavetrader at the close.

One of the most fancied horses for the Cambridgeshire is Sir Archibald, and he now ran a most interesting public trial against Succour in the Challenge Stakes. The other horse receiving 9/5 from Sir Archibald. The wagering, always very close, made the latter favourite at the finish, and the duo, mused no little excitement. Succour got his head in front at the start, and increased his advantage, when, under the severe pressure, Sir Archibald threw up his head and finished none too gamely, losing by three parts of a length.

Chief interest in the proceedings in the Park Paddock at Newmarket yesterday centred in the sale of Nocturnal, who was put up to auction with other of Mr. James Buchanan's. This New Zealand-bred colt by Multi-form—La Note is said to have cost Mr. Buchanan 5,000gns., and he now went to Mr. A. Portman for 500gns. Nocturnal was purchased by Mr. Sam Pickering for 310gns. Ormston by Mr. Tennant for 210gns., and Mr. J. A. de Rothschild gave 400gns. for Laughing Mirror. Mr. A. Belmont's American-bred yearlings fetched very poor prices.

### NORWICH BEAT THE PALACE.

NORWICH CITY 2; CRYSTAL PALACE, 0.—Crystal Palace after doing very well in recent matches, so well that they for a brief time headed the Southern League table, came a cropper yesterday at Norwich, where they were beaten by 2 goals to 0 in the Southern League. It was thanks to Johnson, the clever Palace goalkeeper, that the defeat was no greater than it was. He played a very fine game indeed, saving many difficult shots in the first half, and giving a particularly brilliant display after the interval, and in some exciting play he saved shot after shot.

But the pressure was too great for a goalkeeper to keep out all the shots, and he was beaten once in each half. During scoring three minutes more half-time, and Smith from a free kick in the second half.

There were changes in both teams. Baughop and Walker making a welcome reappearance for the Palace, and Newlands and Silor for Norwich.

### LONDON F.A. CUP.

WEST HAM UNITED, 3; DULWICH HAMLET, 3.—If a trifle lucky, Dulwich Hamlet accomplished a very good performance in drawing with West Ham United at Upton Park yesterday in the first round of the above competition. Early in the game the smart combination of their forwards took the professionals by surprise. From a neat pass by Evans, Vasey scored with a left-foot shot, and though hurt soon afterwards, the centre added another goal after a hot shot by Brennan had been saved. With Vasey hurt and off the field for a time, Dulwich went through an anxious period, but some smart clearances, but was at last beaten by Brown, and Sloan equalised after he had forced a corner.

Despite constant pressure, West Ham could not net the lead before half-time, and a quarter of an hour after resuming Vasey dribbled through the backs and scored his third goal, giving Dulwich the lead again. Miller, West Ham's centre forward, was then off the field. Each goal had a narrow escape before Knight Thompson could not clear, and the ball went through. With the second three all West Ham attacked heavily, and repeated shots either just failed or were stopped by Thompson, one of whose saves from Percy was quite brilliant.

Twice the Hamlet broke away dangerously, and Brennan failed when having only the goalkeeper to beat, and the score remained three all to the end. Over 2,000 people watched a thoroughly interesting game, the receipts amounting to 255.

### DRAW FOR THE SECOND ROUND.

After the match the Cup Committee of the London Association met and made the draw for the second round, which came out thus:—Leyton v. Clapton Orient, Millwall v. Chelsea, West Ham United or Dulwich Hamlet v. Tottenham Hotspur, Woolwich Arsenal v. Crystal Palace. To be played on or before November 30.

### THE INJURY TO J. G. G. BIRKETT.

J. G. G. Birkett's injury last Saturday is more serious than was expected, and he will not, it is stated, be able to turn out for London against the Australians on October 24 at Richmond. An examination showed that he has dislocated one of the clavicles of his right shoulder. The extent of the injury is clearly shown by two interesting X-ray photographs. The famous Harlequin and international footballer's medical advisers tell him that footer is off for the present.

At the annual meeting of the Cambridge University Rugby Football Club it was resolved to separate the offices of president and secretary, so as to divide and lessen the work. Rev. J. H. Gray was re-elected president, and H. G. Comber was elected treasurer. W. G. Joly is captain, W. D. Purvis secretary, and K. G. MacLeod and C. C. G. Wright committeemen.

## AUSTRALIANS WIN AGAIN.

Neath and Aberavon Beaten by 15 Points to 0.

A team selected from the Neath and Aberavon Clubs gave the Waratahs a hard game at Neath yesterday but were beaten by 3 goals to 0. The match was very fast throughout. The Australians, except that Smith stood down, had the same team in the field as defeated Glamorgan, and the Colonials were given a great reception.

The rain which fell at midday did not affect the ground, and the weather was perfect for football, the attendance being the biggest ever seen at Neath.

For the first twenty minutes the play was of a give and take character, chiefly amongst the forwards. Unfortunately for Neath, D. H. Davies, one of their best forwards, was injured, leaving the field with a broken rib. After the home team had lost Davies, the Australians quickly scored two tries. The first was the outcome of some fine passing, Moran eventually getting over, and Carroll gained the second after a brilliant run. Carmichael was successful with both place kicks. Carroll scored the try in the second half, Carmichael again converting.

The game on the whole was rather disappointing. There was a meagre display of passing on both sides.

The Welshmen beat the Colonials in heeling and in getting possession of the ball. This they did three times out of every five. When the ball came out the forwards on both sides broke up quickly, and thus assisted the backs in defending. At times the game was played with great vigour, this tending to prevent a display of the finer features of Rugby football.

For the visiting team, Hickey, Carroll, and Wood played finely. Wood was exceptionally smart in breaking away, but in Shon Evans he found an opponent of more than ordinary merit.

Of the visiting forwards McIlroy, Rowe, and Richards were the most prominent. Rowe, who played on the outskirts of the scrum, was of great assistance to his half, but his style of play was that of an obstructionist.

The Welshmen played a hard game, and considering that they were a man short for three parts of the match they did well. Hughes, Rees, Thomas, and Shon Evans were the pick of the home backs. Shon Evans was particularly fine. The forwards were admirable, and the seven Welshmen more than held the eight Colonials.

The Waratahs were entertained to dinner in the evening by the Neath Club.

## EASTERN COUNTIES' FINE WIN.

Splendid Half-Back Play Enables Them to Defeat Kent by 24pts. to 7.

We were treated to a delightful surprise at Blackheath yesterday, the Eastern Counties beating Kent by 3 goals and 3 tries to a dropped goal and a try—just a matter of 24 points to 7. There was no nonsense about the victory. There was some attempt after the game to disparage the prowess of the Eastern Counties, but it was a thoroughly genuine win, and brought about by capital football.

The Counties did not hold any particular advantage forward, and the general play was more even than the score would suggest. The Counties, however, had two halves who understood each other's methods—Heale and Lindsay, of the London Hospital—and one knows from long experience that two good halves can easily turn a game. Heale and Lindsay did so yesterday. Neither scored, but they made some good openings for the men behind them. They played up to Wilson and Palmer on the right wing, with the result that both scored three tries. Palmer ran splendidly, and was clever, too. Both obtained two tries in the first half, and at the interval the Eastern Counties led by two goals and two tries to a try. The Kent try was gained by Smith, one of the three-quarters.

Afterwards Wilson and Palmer each won over once, and Pillman dropped a goal for Kent. Pillman was pulled out of the scrum, but it was not a wise move. However, as he dropped a goal he justified himself, if not the general policy.

The London team to play the Australians will be chosen today. I heard some complaints that there were no programmes at Blackheath yesterday. Surely the officials know the men who take part in these games. After all, it does not matter much. They cannot blunder more than they have done in the past.

TOUCH JUDGE.

MIDLAND COUNTIES, 23 points; EAST MIDLANDS, 13.—After looking certain to be severely beaten in the Rugby county championship match the Midlands Counties team at Nottingham yesterday pulled the game round in remarkable style, and gained a substantial victory. So much were they outplayed that in the first half East Midlands crossed their line three times. Two of these tries were converted. East Midlands led at the interval by 13 points to 0. The complete change, however, came over the game afterwards, and in the end the Midlands won by 23 points to 13.

At the outset the form was rather poor, both teams taking some time to settle down, but gradually the play improved, and Midlands, who were of Nottingham, both doing excellent work for East Midlands. Heard scored the first try for the visiting side, but taking the kick himself he failed to convert. Later on, however, he again got over, and Mobbs also scored. In both instances Heard placed goals, and East Midlands crossed over leading by 12 points and a try to nothing.

When the game was resumed the Midlands' forwards played a fine game, packing much better and carrying nearly all the scrummages. Heard, Harrison, and Gompertz tried their best for East Midlands to keep the side together, but with their forwards beaten for possession in most cases they had little chance of doing any effective work.

Very soon Cooper kicked a penalty goal for the Midlands, B. W. Assinder following that with a dropped goal. Then Hobbs and Somerville scored splendid tries, Cooper placing a goal in each case. This gave the Midlands the lead before the end of the first half. Dixie Smith added further tries. Midlands therefore won by two placed goals, a dropped goal, a penalty goal, and two tries to two goals and a try.

### OXFORD TRIAL MATCH.

In the Rugby trial match at Oxford yesterday the Colours, who won by 5 goals and 5 tries to a try, had the assistance of nine Old Blues as well as Sloan, the Scottish international. The Whites were completely outplayed, and could score only once, Robertson getting over. Gilroy played well for the Whites.

The try scorers for the Colours were Williamson, Hassall, and Martin, two each, and Honey, Tarr, Poulton, and Roberts. The last-named converted five of them.

## OLYMPIC HOCKEY.

France, England, Ireland, and Scotland to Compete for the Championship.

The hockey games of the International Olympiad will begin on October 29 and end on October 31, the original idea of a week's play having been abandoned, partly with a desire to suit the convenience of the other countries. The programme has now been definitely fixed up.

On the Thursday, at 1.45 p.m., Germany will play Scotland, and at three o'clock England will meet France, Ireland and Wales, who have byes, will engage in the semi-finals on the Friday, the same times being adhered to, and on the Saturday the final will be played at three o'clock.

On the Thursday evening the visiting teams will be entertained at a banquet at the Hotel Russell (7 p.m.), and as well as the tickets gone for that well over 200 are expected to sit down. Lord Desborough, the chairman of the British Olympic Council, will preside, and I think everyone will agree that the Hockey Association has done everything possible to make their section of the games a success.

As to the probable result, England ought to win. It is true France played them a drawn match last season, but that was in Paris on none too good a ground, and I doubt not that the Stadium score will show a big margin in favour of the home country, who have paid the visitors the compliment of selecting their strongest team. I notice that the omission of H. R. Jordan has been called into question, but it cannot be said that the once-famous inside left is playing up to his old form. Indeed, he is a long way below it, and that is one of the reasons why the Staines club are not doing themselves justice.

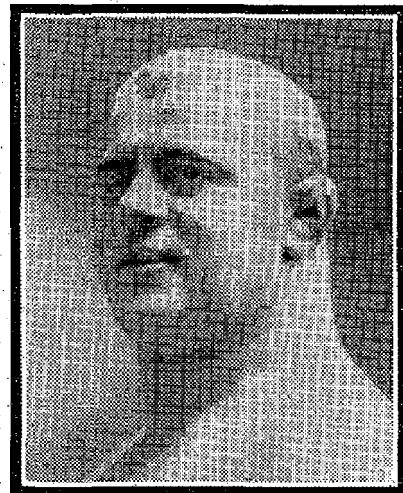
The defeat of Staines by Kingston Hill, who scored 5 goals to 2, was a fine performance on the part of the latter club, which has sprung into fame in a remarkable manner. Powerful at half-back, where W. E. Gardner and C. H. Hodding (late of the West) are showing fine form, and with a prolific scoring forward in Hugh Doherty, and steady full-backs, they did fair to make a bold bid for Southern supremacy.

Meanwhile, Hampstead, the premier club team of last season, are more than holding their own, and they showed brilliant form in beating Wimbledon by 9-0. They have lost M. Sherwell, their clever right-back, whose place is, however, being well filled by J. H. Bennett, the old Oxonian, and S. Sherwell, a younger brother, promises to settle down nicely at inside left. Against Wimbledon C. Logan made his first appearance of the season, and played as well as ever.

Beckenham are going great guns. Five teams took the field last week-end, and all were victorious. In the West Country the crack club, East Gloucestershire, nearly came undone against Bristol South, but just muddled through by the odd goal in nine. In the Midlands Edgbaston beat Leamington by 13-0, our old friend, H. J. Goodwin, the brilliant Cantab, being the bright particular star in the attack. FREE HIT.

### A CHALLENGER FOR ZBYSCO.

Giovanni Raicevich, the Italian wrestler, wishes to have a match with ZbySCO for the Græco-Roman championship of the world and a stake of £200 a side. He has won many of the big tournaments of recent years, including the Liege contest in 1905, Buenos Ayres in 1906, and the world's championship in Paris in 1907. Among those he has beaten is Laurent Beucaeris, who is well known in this country. Raicevich has deposited £200 with the Sportsman to make the match with ZbySCO. He is twenty-five years of

lage, weighs 18st., and expresses himself as being confident that he can beat the famous Galician who made himself so popular in England last winter.

As ZbySCO seems at a standstill, so far as his match with Hackenschmidt is concerned, this might be a chance of making a match which would open the season well, especially as Italians are popular with the English sporting public owing to the exploits of Dorando in the Marathon.

### SPORTING NEWS ITEMS.

Worcestershire beat Notts in a county golf match at Hollinwell yesterday by 9 matches to 1.

His Highness the Jam of Nawangar has promised an annual donation of £150 for at least three years towards the establishment of a nursery for young Sussex cricketers.
